All in all the year was a never-to-be-forgotten one, and amidst our pleasures we half sighed that we should return but once again.

Autumn of 1929! But what a different season from the one four short years ago. The glories of the campus were the same, the incoming freshmen seemed as eager and as verdant, but we had been transformed. We were no longer a raw and eager troop of embryo teachers; we had assumed a dignity, a quietness, and a poise essential in those who are to determine the destinies of a republic. To our already developed zest for learning was added the impetus of the new library—a building to be proud of, a building to be used. It exceeded all our hopes and increased our one regret that we had only one short year in which to absorb its store of knowledge and enjoy its comfort and its beauty. This year, too, saw the illumination of the dome of the Water Tower, Ypsilanti's well-known landmark. Its glow seemed like a beacon leading the way to the institution whose riches we had enjoyed for all too short a time. The departing Seniors look with regret on the beckoning dome and yet with hope that it may truly become a beacon calling others to the same opportunities and pleasures with which Michigan State Normal College has enriched the Class of 1930.

Where is the land of Smithereens? Does anybody know The land of broken soup tureens, The land where the cracked cups go?


I've looked on all the maps I've found. Among their pinks and greens I've scanned the names from Perth to Mound But none says, "Smithereens".

Pi Kappa Delta, which originated at Ottawa University, Kansas, and Ripon College, Wisconsin, in 1913, now numbers one hundred twenty-one chapters, located in all sections of the country. Kappa Delta Pi is an international honorary and professional fraternity in education, organized at the University of Illinois in 1909, and incorporated in 1911. The fraternity is composed of sixty-two local chapters with a total membership of over twelve thousand, and a Laureate Chapter having a membership of twenty nationally known educators.

There are now two chapters in Michigan; Pi chapter which was established in June, 1922 at Michigan State Normal College, and Beta Iota chapter of Western State Teachers' College at Kalamazoo which was installed in 1929.

The purpose of Kappa Delta Pi is to encourage in its members a higher degree of consecration to social service by fostering high professional and scholarship standards, and by recognizing outstanding service in the field of education.

The qualifications for membership to Kappa Delta Pi are as follows: full junior standing, general scholarship of a grade in the upper quartile of the institution, the indication that there will be continued interest in the field of education, and the manifestation of desirable social qualities.

The Eighth Convocation of Kappa Delta Pi convened at the Ritz-Carlton in Atlantic City February twenty-fifth and sixth with delegates representing each of the sixty-two chapters ranging from California to Maine and from Florida to Oregon. The greater part of the convention was occupied with the business of the national organization. The official Convocation Dinner was a most impressive event; Dorothy Canfield Fisher spoke to more than two hundred guests on the subject "Learn or Perish" in which she discussed very interestingly adult education.

The present year has been one of unusual activity and accordingly of success for the Men's Union of the Michigan State Normal College. This regularity, this activity, and this success is due mainly to the efforts of Joe Moran who had the necessary push to create the energy to carry this year's Men's Union to unprecedented heights.

The Union was under way from the start when representatives met the Freshmen men and guided their participation in Freshmen Week. At this time the new men were duely introduced to the Men's Union when—in accordance with a new custom—the Freshmen were given Union pins. This action has the effect of showing the new men that they have a definite place in the activities of the college and are welcome to share the privileges and the responsibilities of the Union.

As the football season progressed it became apparent that our athletic teams were without a suitable or distinctive nickname. In response to this agitation, the Union offered a prize to the student who might submit the name which a

faculty jury thought appropriate. The name "Hurons" was chosen from several hundred selections and to both Miss Gretchen Borst and Mr. George Hanner go the honor of the choice.

The high point in the business of the Union was the sponsoring of the campus migration to Kalamazoo. An unprecedented crowd of five hundred and twelve rooters left by train, paraded through the streets of Kazoo, saw a thrilling football game, and returned happily after having partaken of the pleasures of the best trip the Union has ever undertaken. May there ever be such trips as that one. Red Shaughnessey and Joe Pray were active in promoting this event.

Homecoming was the next big event on the program. Wes Rea started things when he produced a stirring pep meeting which was followed by the annual "theater party". Farmsworth Gorton directed the "most colorful" parade, led by the band, through the main streets of the city, Saturday morning. An excellent—we won—game and the football banquet in the evening brought to a close the festivities.

A new annual event was introduced to the college campus this year when the Men's Union and the Women's League co-sponsored a Kollege Kermess. Bob LeAnderson headed the men's activities in the venture which cleared over two hundred and fifty dollars for the Union Building at the same time providing a colorful carnival for the thorough enjoyment of fifteen hundred teachers and students.

The winter term's activities climaxed in the annual Men's Mixer held, as usual, in the gymnasium. Jesse Batcheldor's committee served up a copious feed of hot dogs, cider, apples, and doughnuts which was quickly devoured to the tune of the band. Farmsworth Gorton, master of ceremonies, then introduced a varied and boisterous entertainment consisting of excellent band music, the gym team, popular music by the Manual Cigar girls and a well-known ventriloquist. Everyone went home in the highest spirits except a few who felt vague internal misgivings testifying to excess in the gastronomical part of the entertainment.

Perhaps the force that contributed most to the strength of the Men's Union this year was the work of the program committee—Joe Moran, Neil Gray, Allan Sawdy, and Raymond Stites. Meetings were held regularly with a half an hour devoted to a short address by some speaker, usually from our campus. These programs formed the backbone of the meetings and were very well received by the members. Talks were given by Professor Pray—Americanization, Professor Alexander—Formation of a Men's Glee Club; Professor Fagerstrom—Abraham Lincoln; Miss Wise—Work of the Appointment Bureau; and Colonel Miller, from the University of Michigan—On the Guns that Bombed Paris during the World War. These people gave willingly of their time and knowledge and the Union certainly appreciates their kindness.

As the Aurora goes to press, interest points to the annual Barbeque and Cap Night when the whole college will turn out for the feast, the spring games between the sophs and freshmen, and the Cap Night ceremonies.

And so, with the closing of Cap Night festivities, the work of the Men's Union ceases for a period to be taken up anew by the ever changing personnel of college life.







HAPPY AS KINGS

Strolling with my sister down Chicago's famous Michigan Boulevard, we were watching the People, Shop-Windows, and other interesting Things.—but especially the People, who are most interesting—and my sister remarked:

"Do you ever notice how They all hurry past? So Few take their Time, and so Few have a calm, pleasant, facial expression! Most of the Men's eyes are squinty, like a Miser's, as if they were to prest by business that they cannot look up at the sky, or over to Lake Michigan, and get an eyeful of GOD."

"And note as much," I added, "how few women look really contented and happy!"

Then, in relief, we turned to our usual pastime, sorting out the cheerful folks.

You must have been made thoughtful by the attention-compelling remark of the intelligent young Chinese servant (in that unique one-act play, "Struggle and Flight," in "Manuscripts" Magazine) who noticed that we Americans are like the mouse in the laboratory oxygen tank—"jump aroun' fas' and soon die," while the ideal Oriental mind takes everything more calmly, faces life like the placid, impassive face of the big Buddha, and finds more satisfaction in life than we.

How often we scorn the "somber-eyed dreamer" who yet may be finding much more practical joy in life than we who boast of being acutely practical, very awake, and quite business-like.

To find JOY in all things that can possibly contain any joy, and to accept sorrow and adversity calmly, as our Oriental friend accepts them,—is an Ideal. "The tree of patience is bitter, but it bears sweet fruits."

To love Music, books, art, science, and Nature, her marvel, and endless wonders—in themselves enough to keep us all—old and young—wide-eyed, child-eyed, open-eared and radiantly alive with wonder and astonishment—is an Ideal.

(At four years of age, in 1910, I saw that phenomena, Halley's comet—and if I had no other thing to live for, I should like to live until 1986 when that comet will return to blaze in our skies. As for Tomorrow, I shall take my little 115-power microscope on a hike with me down to a lazy creek not far from here, and see a jungle of queer animals and plants in a drop of stagnant water—paramoecia, hydra, algae, and myriad others.)

Childish as it may seem, I still treasure it, and I shall always treasure it—one of the best things that Robert Louis Stevenson ever wrote:

"The world is so full of a number of things,
I'm sure we should all be as happy as kings."


The Campus Club O. E. S. has been organized for several years and is for the purpose of bringing the fellow O. E. S. members on the Campus into closer contact with each other.

Other interesting traditions are our Christmas trip to the O. E. S. Villa at Adrian and our Spring party.



THE PRESBYTERIAN STUDENT'S SOCIETY

This has been an unusually busy and prosperous year for the Christian Endeavor Society of the Presbyterian Church. The activities began when nine delegates were sent to the International Convention at Kansas City where they exchanged ideas with twelve thousand other young people. At home the Endeavor Society has conducted weekly devotional meetings and has presented some speakers of unusual merit, among whom was Dr. A. B. Dodd of China. It has sponsored a concert by the University of Michigan Glee Club, and has redecorated the dining rooms of the church in which many dinners and parties have been given. The Society has tried to carry out its purpose which is to provide a congenial religious atmosphere for the Presbyterian students of the college.





THE CONGREGATIONAL STUDENT GROUP

The Congregational Student Group has been organized for five years. It has been one aim of the organization to give the college students a church home and church life as nearly like that of his own community as is possible, and at the same time to help him grow in his religious life. Constant effort is made to consider the individual student and to this end the church people welcome students not only to the services but also to their homes.

The program for the past year included a discussion group with a fellowship supper following the Vesper service, a group of study classes on Sunday mornings, and Friday night gatherings at the church with special parties occasionally. Special activities have been carried on by the social service and deputation groups and the drama club has presented a number of short plays. The group has participated in a number of inter-church activities. The student work is maintained by the Wesley Foundation to promote religious training and the development of leadership and fellowship among students.

Our new Student Secretary, Miss Lillian Nordquest has done splendidly and we would like to express our appreciation of her efforts. We are glad that she will be back with us again next year. The activities of the group have consisted chiefly of the Evensong, Sunday night, Friendly Hour at Starkweather, and the regular monthly parties. At Evensong a few outside speakers have been heard but a majority of the programs provided by the students. Questions of interest have been discussed and thought about. Although we have not always come to definite conclusions, we feel that the discussions have been of great value.






















ATHLETICS WALTER CAMP New Britain, Connecticut, 1859-1925 Leader in Health Education


YPSILANTI 13, NOTRE DAME "B" 7; OCTOBER 19




Ypsilanti 6, John Carrol 6; November 16



YP ILANTI 24, CENTRAL STATE O; OCTOBER 26







Western State was carded for February 6, but college officials postponed the game indefinitely and the game was never played. The Central team came out of the north seeking revenge, but went back home on the short end of a 28 to 26 score after a hard-fought game. After this win, the team took spirit and whipped Adrian in an extra period game by a 26 to 22 tally.

Oberlin put a temporary halt to the winning streak by a 27 to 22 victory over the Ypsi cagers. Undaunted by defeat, the boys next met and took Armour Tech into camp 35 to 20. In this game Giles started his scoring streak with seven foul shots out of seven tries and a basket to b ot. A few days later Detroit took a 24 to 22 beating at the hands of the locals best working combination: Giles and Gabel at forward, Rice at center, and aptain Whitney and Muelich at guard positions.


NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP CROSS COUNTRY TEAM

This Green and White team won the National Junior A. A. U. Championship by defeating Detroit "Y", Indiana University, Ohio State, Cincinnati "Y", Pittsburg, and Penn State. The locals scored 33 points to give them a large winning margin over their nearest op onents, the Detroit team, which had 48 points.

Roger Arnett, Huron star, ran a beautiful race, covering the six mile course in 31 minutes and 33 seconds to take first place in the team scoring. Morcombe, O'Connor, and Bauer finished third, fourth, and fifth in the order named while Captain Wolfe finished in twentieth place, the last man to score for Ypsi. Altaffer, who ran his last race for Ypsi there, was running in fifteenth place but was forced to drop out about a quarter of a mile from the finish tape when he was seized with a bad attack of cramps.

The team received a large silver plaque and each of the men were given medals emblematic of membership on the winning team. The first four Hurons to score also received awards for individual places.




