OUR UNION BUILDING






VARSITY "Y" CLUB


Arnett was captain of the cross country team last fall, and set new records in winning individual honors in the state and conference runs. He also holds the two mile track record in the Michigan Collegiate Conference circuit. College records from the mile up to five miles have been repeatedly smashed by the great distance star.

Arnett was discovered in a track credit class in his first year at Normal, and under careful tutelage rose to supreme heights in state, midwest, and national competition. Before entering Normal, Roger had never taken part in athletics. He made an enviable high school record in academic achievement and music, and was continuing his splendid scholastic record in college. At the time of the unfortunate accident, he had twenty-three A's, eighteen B's, and three C's.

Arnett was working his way through college, and was a junior by credits. He would have had two more years of competition in track and there is no telling how far he might have gone in that time. To say the least, he would have been a candidate for the 1932 United States Olympic team.

All members of Michigan State Normal College showed their highest respect and admiration for the sterling athlete and scholar by putting over a gigantic sports night program for his benefit.





The year 1930-31, now drawing to a close, has been probably the most successful period the Men's Union has ever enjoyed; made possible largely by the wonderful cooperation and excellent leadership which has been offered the organization by the student body as a whole. In Alden Tomion, Merlin Wolfe, Dean James M. Brown and one or two others the masculine faction of Normal College had a group of leaders who carried the organization to a height which has never been reached by the organization for many years.

The Union started the year off with a bang by greeting the incoming yearlings with a warm hand. Big Brothers had been selected to meet the freshmen, and they were very active in their tasks, and as a result few new students found difficulty in finding a pillow on which to place their weary head after a tiresome journey from the home town. No sooner had they arrived upon the campus than they were feted with a gigantic freshman mixer, which was a fine get together for the yearlings and which event permitted them to make a much closer contact with their classmates. President Tomion presided over this gathering, and with his

excellent diplomacy put a wonderful spirit into the yearling ranks. During Freshmen Week the group hung most attractive Union pins on each of the eager lads, and entertained them highly with lectures, mixers, etc.

At the first meeting of the Union the freshmen were given to understand that there would be no hazing this year and that in return they would be expected to wear their pots to their greatest extent. As a result of this bit of psychology the little green caps were worn better than they have ever been worn. Almost every frosh's head was adorned with a togue. The freshman games proved a

great success and were run off under excellent supervision.

As the Michigan game drew near it became apparent that the Hurons were going to produce one of the greatest football teams that has ever represented Michigan Normal. In view of this fact the Union set about the task of putting on a great homecoming. Western State was the opposition for the occasion, and a day crammed with activity ensued. For the party Jack McGay's fine music was secured and the event was a great success all around. The tickets were placed on sale three weeks before the ball, but with a harmonizing committee and fine spirit they were all in the hands of purchasers before the first week had elapsed. The party was known as the "Yule Log Drag", and it was under the general chair-

manship of President Tomion.

The Union responded to a good cause wonderfully when Roger Arnett was injured in an accident on his way to a track meet. A Benefit Sports Night was put on by the acting president of the Union, Merlin Wolfe, and his assistants. The program for the affair consisted of basketball games, clogging numbers, a gymnastic exhibition, and a pair of boxing matches. More than a thousand persons packed the Central High School gymnasium for the occasion and in addition to the tickets sold many individuals and independent organizations contributed to the worthy cause. Well over the set goal of \$500 was reached, and Roger Arnett and his family greatly benefited from the Sports Night.

As the Aurora goes to press the Union is contemplating a bigger and better

Cap Night, a tentative spring party, and many other social events.

In Dean of Men James M. Brown, Alden Tomion and one or two others the group had some of the finest leaders that organization has had for some time, and the masculine faction of Normal College will surely miss men of that type when they have been graduated.






WOMEN'S DEBATE


MICHIGAN ORATORICAL LEAGUE CONTESTS

Last spring's oratorical events in this league came too late to appear in the Aurora. After winning the gold medal in the state contest, Frederic L. Fuller entered the contest of the Eastern Division of the Interstate Oratorical Association, held at the Normal College, April 11. The speakers represented West Virginia, Kentucky, Pennsylvania, Ohio and Michigan. In this competition John T. Galloway of Muskingum College and Mr. Fuller survived. He then entered the national contest of the Interstate Association, held at Northwestern University, April 25. Here he matched his oratorical powers against orators from the University of Notre Dame, Penn, Carleton, Muskingum and Park Colleges, and emerged as the champion national orator, and was awarded the gold medal of the association.

Both Ernestine Anderson, last year's woman orator, who tied for first place in the state contest, and Mr. Fuller participated in the national Pi Kappa Delta Tournament; Mr. Fuller being awarded honorable mention in the final contest.

This year's events opened with the 42nd annual college contest held December 4, in which Ardith E. Stoltz, senior and J. Harry Adams, senior, were chosen college orators. Miss Stoltz chose as the subject of her oration, "A Woman's Choice", and developed a strong protest against the use of the cigarette among women. Mr. Adams' oration was a discussion of the problem of law and order among nations and the necessity for the United States adopting certain farreaching reforms looking toward world peace. In the divisional contest held at Hillsdale, March 6, in competition with orators from five other colleges of the division, both survived and entered the state contest at Mount Pleasant, March 13. Both gave a good account of themselves. Miss Stoltz was awarded the silver medal and second place, and Mr. Adams, handicapped by a persistent case of flu, tied for fifth place.

At the Pi Kappa Delta Provincial Oratorical Contest at Bowling Green, Ohio, April 17, 1931, in which twelve colleges participated, both Miss Stoltz and Mr. Adams were awarded first places and the gold medal of the fraternity.



THE COLLEGE ORCHESTRA

For the last four years the Orchestra has furnished the music for all Commencements and Convocations beside giving the incidental music for numerous plays and pageants. It has also played in Assembles and at Baccalaureate Addresses, Alumni Banquets, etc.

Careful selection of music adapted to the capacity of amateurs while worthy of the attention of artists as to its content has been the policy. This makes it possible for players to develop in technique and in understanding and at the same time to present to an audience something interesting and worth while. This policy of course involves the necessity of careful work in rehearsal.

The personnel includes half again as many as last year and the development in capability is almost proportionate to the growth in numbers. The Orchestra this year initiated the practice of giving programs elsewhere than in Ypsilanti, the first such occasion being a concert in Howell, at which several solos by members of the Orchestra with orchestral accompaniment were given. It also gave a full program in Pease Auditorium at the graduation exercises of the Orchestra and Band students, May 27, at which the solo performances of graduates were accompanied by the orchestra.

The Band is composed of two classes of students: those who are taking the Band and Orchestra course as a future vocation, and those who possess musical talent which they employ merely for pleasure or as an avocation. Its personnel has numbered during the past two years about thirty, but an intensive drive is under way to double this number. A cordial welcome awaits performers on all instruments.

Band duties consist of three hours of rehearsal and drill each week. During the winter and spring terms rehearsals are conducted in the auditorium on Monday and Wednesday from 6:30 to 8:00 P.M. In the football term the rehearsals are held in the gymnasium from 6:30 to 7:30 on Monday and Wednesday, with formation drill on Thursday from 9:00 to 10:00 A.M. Public duties include playing for Varsity football games, and participation in whatever parades, concerts and other special events may require band music. Students fulfilling these conditions and showing the required record in attendance and punctuality are granted credits from the Athletic Department. Special Band sweaters and medals are also awarded for long service.

During the past year the Band appeared at every home Varsity football game, as well as the University of Michigan game at Ann Arbor. They also played at the dedication of the new Charles McKenny Hall, and at the laying of the corner stone. Two of its best accomplishments were the Homecoming Day Parade and the opening of the Kollege Komedy. Several engagements remain to be played this term.

These men are showing excellent morale and enthusiasm, and expect that their faithful, hard practice will make them one of the ranking college bands.

The Band is under the supervision of Professor Luther Moffitt and is directed and taught by D. Chester Ryan. The street parades and field maneuvers are headed by the efficient baton of Drum Major Richard Hodges.



REVIEW OF CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON





A fast, light Georgetown College aggregation met a faster, heavier, and smarter machine i the Hurons, and received a 45 to 0 defeat her on November 1st.



Starting the season with but five lettermen, Coach Rynearson developed another winning quintet. The loss of Giles, Brown, Whitney, Van Fleet, Arnold, Rice and DeLong put a real problem before the Huron mentor. The addition of

several stars from the ranks of the 1930 frosh aggregation and the performance of the vets gave the varsity a formidable front. The old men back: Captain Ed Gabel, Howard Leach, George Muellich, Marvin Mittlestat, and Howard Chanter gave Rynie the nucleus for his squad.

Walter Kazlusky, LeRoy Ostlund, and Waldo Ashley, all sophomores, won regular berths on the varsity after the season got underway. These three boys developed fast and by the end of the season were performing like seasoned veterans. Much is being expected of them next year. Bailey, Cieslewski, Seitz, and Thorpe rounded out the Huron squad, which after an unimpressive start romped through the latter portion of their schedule to finish the season with eight victories to five losses.

Normal lost the opening game of the year on the home court to Central State in a thrilling battle which was decided only after two overtime periods. The Green and White then upset the General Motors Technicians at Flint in a fast hard tilt but lost to the Munies from Detroit City College a few nights later by a 31 to 27 score.

Western State proved too tough for the Hurons on the Kalamazoo court, but the following week a rejuvenated Rynearson five conquered the Bearcats at Mt. Pleasant in a spectacular court dual, 35 to 28. Howdie Leach starred in the tilt against the fast and heretofore undefeated University of Michigan B quintet, who fell by a 22 to 18 count before the Hurons.

General Motors Tech lost their second game to the Normal crew 33 to 22 on the Ypsilanti court, but the Wolverine varsity led by Captain-elect Norm Daniels swamped the Green and White 46 to 8. Adrian College nosed out the Hurons in a furious last minute rally two nights later.


The feature of the entire season was the brilliant home stretch spurt which won for the varsity the runnerup position in the Michigan Collegiate Conference and carried them to four consecutive victories over Detroit City, Northern State, Western State and Adrian. Brilliant floorwork, and a dazzling offensive attack proved the undoing of each of the defeated quintets. It was Western's only defeat in the conference cha e. Captain Gabel, Leach, Ostlund, Ashley, Kazlusky and Muellich were the men who figure prominently in the Huron winning streak.

Three members of the varsity squad will be lost by graduation: Muellich, Chanter, and Mittlestat.



VARSITY TENNIS SQUAD



The prospects for a winning season are bright with Soule, Hawn, and Wolfe forming the nucleus of the team. Other men of promise are also reporting for practice.


