From vulgar bounds with brave disorder part, And snatch a grace within the reach of art.




Harbor of many a stranger, free to friend, Ever and always, O thou house of all man.




And about thee to the pulse of the rhythm let the inspired feet of these water nymphs keep falling free.

To John M. Munson, our new president, we extend a hand of friendship. He comes with a splendid record and we are anticipating the stimulation that will surely attend a man of his character.





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

The woodthrush hymns his vespers to the evening star.



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


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

### GENEVIEVE M. WALTON

The faculty of the Michigan State Normal College wishes to express its feeling of great loss in the death of Miss Walton, for many years the librarian of the College.

Her life was one of devotion to her work and to the welfare of the college. She centered every energy on the upbuilding of the library and used every inducement and plan of organization to make the library facilities available to all. Her one conception of the library was that of its usefulness.

She remains in our memory as a symbol of duty completely performed, of orderliness, of system, of organization carried to the highest degree.

To the students, Miss Walton was always a wise friend, encouraging, stimulating, admonishing, rewarding and helping. To thousands of our graduates our library can never be the same for it stands in their minds as an expression of her personality.

Her complete womanliness and spirit of devotion to her work and to the college seem to be with us yet, the library is her monument, the work of her own hands and heart, the symbol of her completed work.

### SAMUEL B. LAIRD

Professor Laird died in his home in Greensboro N. C. on Tuesday, September 27, 1932; born May 28, 1849.

The abiding impressions left upon those who knew him were his transparent sincerity and his exceptional character. From these traits came those other expressions of human service: faith in God and his fellowmen, love of righteousness, truth, and beauty, and a passion for helping others.

As a citizen, he allied himself with the cause of social justice, and gave unreservedly of his strength and wisdom, in private conversation and in public utterances, to the end that his community, his state, his country, and the wide world might encourage and bring to pass conditions for more wholesome living. His influence with the young people was always in the direction of a vital and intelligent citizenship.

As a teacher, he was a friend and inspirer of youth. Cordial in manner, methodical and logical in presenting the problems, the solutions of which were to be considered as mutual, and to be worked out together; and with a personal enthusiasm that was caught by his pupils. Not arbitrary and dogmatic in his views, he taught tolerance. To him, truth in all matters is progressive, and the joy of mastery, a reward in itself. He loved to teach.

Professor Laird was deeply and devotedly religious. To him religion was not entirely a matter of intellectual grasp or emotional stir. Religion must express itself in reverence to God and service to man. His religious life was truly exemplified in the scriptural injunction: "And what doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God." The world is richer because of his life and his influence; memories of his character and his services to humanity can never die.



#### WILLIAM HITTELL SHERZER

A loyal, brave and loving man passed away with the going of William Hittell Sherzer; he was a scholar and a gentleman, in the truest sense of this well-worn phrase. He was one who believed in the efficacy of hard work; one who held steadfastly to his principles; and one simple enough and humble enough to love nature and little children, and to be led by them.

He was a teacher who loved teaching, who studied it as an art and as a science, and who practised it with joy. His lessons will be rehearsed and passed on by thousands of grateful students. His example of patience, courtesy, accuracy and truth-loving will never die.

Because of the man he was, because of his attainments as a scholar and as a teacher, because of his contributions to this institution, and because of his influence as a friend and a co-worker, we, the faculty of the Michigan State Normal College, desire that this expression of appreciation be placed on our permanent records.



#### SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

Four years have wrought a great change in the Class of 1933. How we, as well as our surroundings, have changed since "C. P." placed his signature on our classification cards in the fall of 1929! We numbered seven hundred then but our class roll, in some manner, was greatly reduced. Yearly resolutions have always been quite customary, and so when we were Freshmen we, too, made certain resolutions. Now that we have graduated, we feel we can reveal them without too much embarrassment.

Long ago in the fall of 1929, we (sane of mind and healthy of body) a group of chartreuse Freshmen entered the Michigan State Normal College. After we had convened and elected Dick Morley as our President, we resolved to accomplish certain things, i.e.—That we would find the various class rooms and assemblies without any assistance from the smart Seniors, vociferous Juniors, or silly "Sophs". We vowed to obey all the rules and regulations revealed to us by Miss Walton when she introduced us to the library. We quite agreed with her when she told us we were to be a very fortunate group to be able to enjoy the facilities of a new building with modern equipment, then in the process of completion. It was also mutually agreed among our members to appear as smart and sophisticated as our superiors.

As Sophomores, we immediately held a meeting to revise our Freshmen resolutions. Because Dick Morley displayed such skill in oratorical ability, we decided to reinstate him as President. Our first resolution was that of revenge, to be loosed on the innocent, rather than the guilty. We decided to throw the Freshman class, tout ensemble, in the pool. We considered ourselves the victors until after the class games, when the Freshmen became swimming instructors and introduced us to an entirely new system of diving. The remainder of our resolutions were directed towards accomplishments rather than attitudes, for we decided to make our class as outstanding as possible in speech activities, sports, and social functions.

In our Junior year our one grand resolution and determination was to make the J-Hop, the first to be held in Charles McKenny Hall, the most successful and brilliant affair ever to take place on our campus. We consider it to have been successfully accomplished. The enticing strains of Jack McGay's eleven-piece Boat Club Band invited you to immediately check your wraps and join the revelers in the ballroom. Such splendors that greeted one! Egypt with her costly treasures had been most generous in her contributions. A cabaret, where one could eat and dance, with no cover charge, was inaugurated downstairs. Our President, Carl Wood, and general chairman, Ben Wright, with their escorts were responsible for leading us through the intricacies of the Grand March. Likewise, we agreed to aid the administration in helping them to preserve the luxuries and comforts extended to us through our new Union building. During this year, the success of personal resolutions began to show itself. Such individuals as Carl Wood, who became President of Kappa Delta Pi, Carl Simmons, Captain of the football team, and Red Simmons, an Olympic prospect, all added glory to our class name.

When we became Seniors, we established no resolutions because we considered them too infantile. We were more eager to review our accomplishments since we were Freshmen and to reward and recognize those among us who were outstanding. During this year we were entrusted with practically all major school projects. June Gesell and Dick Morley were co-publishers of our yearbook which recorded in true a la Grecian style the events of the year 1932-1933. Ruth Root and "Whitey" Wittkop served as the respective presidents of the Women's League and Men's Union. Another two outstanding Seniors, Carl Wood and Ben Wright, became professional directors and staged a most stupendous show (Kollege Komedy) for the nominal sum of 15 cents. It is quite widely known that it is due to the fiery debating of Judson Robb that Michigan voted for repeal of the 18th Amendment, while the eloquent and forceful orating of Sylvester Branske could even change the minds of our Missouri population. Through Emma Kemnitz, who proved herself a very capable chairman of the Model League of Nations, we became quite cosmopolitan. However, in spite of all her womanly entreaties, she could not persuade the Chinese delegate to stay until the close of the assembly. During this year graduation came, the final climax to our college career. Besides our diploma, we have the reward of pleasant memories and associations. And so we make our departure, leaving to the Juniors the challenge to do as well as we have done.



#### FRESHMAN CLASS HISTORY

With ceremonius pomp on September 26, 1932, the freshman class of 1933, 580 scholars strong, was welcomed into the innermost portals of this institute of learning. In the brief week known as Freshman Days, old friends were forgotten in the maze of new acquaintances; new habits, better known as "collegiate airs", were acquired and, in many cases, the garb of the well-dressed college man was adopted. The "Freshie" appeared in the classroom in the popular version of the pantaloon, which was nothing more or less than a baggy, shiny pair of corduroy breeches. The homecoming games of November 5 were another source of pleasure to the class. Victorious in three out of four games, it will remain a never-to-be forgotten event. Perhaps its permanence is due to the fact that more than one sophomore was forced to rush to his room, after being dragged through a branch of Ypsilanti's mighty Huron river, to borrow another shirt and pair of pants before entering the

big parade.

The Freshman Mixer, open only to the Freshman class, took place the latter part of November in Charles McKenny ballroom. The party afforded a pleasant opportunity to meet practically every upperclassman on the campus. The refreshments were excellent—the ice cream and cake were declared to be as delicious after the second serving as after the first. A rollicking time was enjoyed by all regardless of the fact that the curfew rang on schedule at 9:45 o'clock.

On the athletic field, the Freshman class forged to the front. The basketball team captured a string of seven out of a possible eight victories. Although the football squad was known for its victories, Coach Stites said that the men on the

team were "the strongest bunch that ever entered here."

With the close of May came the last public appearance of a green-topped freshman—the ancient custom of tossing headgear that denoted first-year rank into a huge bonfire in Sleepy Hollow was followed. The ceremony likewise, was the last freshman activity.



### KAPPA DELTA PI

Kappa Delta Pi, originally an honorary education fraternity, was established at the University of Illinois and incorporated June 8, 1911. Last year the organization was reincorporated as Kappa Delta Pi, an Honor Society in Education. The Society now comprises 89 local chapters and a Laureate chapter.

There are two chapters of the Kappa Delta Pi in Michigan; Pi chapter, established at Michigan State Normal College on June 20, 1922, and Beta Iota chapter at Western State Teachers College, established in 1929.

The purpose of the organization, as expressed in the constitution, shall be "to encourage in its members a higher degree of devotion to social service by (1) fostering high intellectual and personal standards during the period of preparation for teaching and (2) recognizing outstanding services in the field of education." In keeping with this purpose, persons are selected for membership who exhibit worthy educational ideals, sound scholarship, and adequate personal qualifications.

The specific qualifications for membership in Pi chapter are: full junior collegiate standing, general scholarship of a grade above the upper one-fifth point of the college, work in Education to the extent of at least twelve term hours if elected during the Senior year, the indication that there will be continued interest in the field of education, and a manifestation of desirable social qualities.

The culmination of Pi chapters activities for this year was the initiation held in conjunction with Beta Iota chapter at Hotel Hayes in Jackson, February 18. The address, "The National Aspect of Kappa Delta Pi", was given by Dr. E. I. F. Williams of Heidelberg College, Tiffin, Ohio, national recorder-treasurer of Kappa Delta Pi. Both chapters are planning to make the Michigan State Convention of Kappa Delta Pi an annual event.



Pi Kappa Delta is a national honor forensic society now consisting of one hundred-fort; chapters located in colleges from Maine and Florida in the East to Washington and California in the West. Within the last year a chapter has also been installed in the University of Puerta Rico. In March its membership numbered 11,627. It originated at Ottawa University, Kansas and Ripon College, Wisconsin, in 1913.

The local chapter, Michigan Epsilon, number fifty-five, was installed June 10, 1921. Its purpose, as stated in the national constitution, is "to stimulate progress in, and to promote the interests of intercollegiate oratory, debate and public speaking by encouraging a spirit of intercollegiate fellowship, of brotherly co-operation and interest, and by conferring upon deserving candidates a badge of distinction, proficiency and honor, varied and graduated according to merit and achievement". Only those students whose platform proficiency is such that they are chosen to participate in intercollege debates, oratory or extemporaneous speaking are admitted to membership. In debate, the student must have participated in no less than three such debates upon a selective list. Freshmen are not eligible. The annual initiation and dinner are held in May of each year.

In addition to the schedule of intercollege contests, the national council prevides for a national convention and speaking tournament in March of the even years. The last was held at Tulsa, Oklahoma, in March 1932, and was attended by 550 students and faculty. The next national convention and tournament is scheduled to be held at Lexington, Kentucky in March, 1934. In the odd years, provincial tournaments are held. Our chapter is located in the Province of the Lakes, and its tournament was held at Grove City College, Grove City, Pennsylvania, last March.







Professor Roy Welch came from Smith College, Mass. to Ypsilanti to hear the Christmas music. The compositions were treated as individual living things each distinct and particular in its own life. They remain etched unforgettably in the memory. There was confident, reverent assurance in some, darkly tragic moments in others, hearty good cheer where it was appropriate, a surge of released energy at times, and eloquent grandeur when Bach gave the signal. It is the phenomenal resourcefulness of the choir and its sense—musical and verbal—of what was being sung that remains in mind as one of the two great achievements revealed by this concert."

## STUDENTS' RELIGIOUS COUNCIL

The Students' Religious Council, an organization formed for the purpose of directing the campus religious activities, is made up of seven student church representatives and a representative of the Y. W. C. A. The aim of the Council is to promote religious feeling and to facilitate religious co-operation among the students.

Traditional activities were departed from in planning the religious program for 1932-1933; with the establishment of a School of Religion, with classes held weekly at Starkweather Hall, and with a series of monthly programs, at which prominent religious leaders spoke, the success of the new college year, in a spiritual way, was early apparent.

The gymnasium was the locale of the traditional Interdenominational Party, and the affair assumed gala proportions as a Gypsy Costume Party.

With many prominent and active student workers graduating, the leadership will necessarily pass to new hands in 1934. There is, however, every assurance that the interest and co-operative effort of the past year will increase, and the religious life of the campus will be carried on and made the more articulate.






The local Pan-Hellenic organization has been active on this campus since 1926. Its members are representatives from both local and national sororities. The offices are filled by a system of rotation.




# JACKET WINNERS

Though beaten in the opening and closing games, Michigan Normal's Hurons were generally conceded to have gone through their best season in years. Starting the year with little more than a green gang of sophomore lineman, Coach Elton Rynearson and his aides labored untiringly on fundamentals almost within ten days of the opening tilt with University of Detroit. At this point the Huron mentors began whipping the machine into shape, and on September 30 presented an eleven comparable to any that had taken the field in the first game for Normal in many seasons.

#### University of Detroit 13 — Michigan Normal 7

For nearly three quarters Rynearson's charges headed the touted Titans with a seven point lead made possible when Frank Arnold lobed a floater over the center of the line to Mel Thorpe who skirted over the last chalk mark for a score. Late in the third period, his quarterbacks having used everything they had, to no avail, the Titan board of strategy sent one diminutive Harold McCracken into the Red and White lineup. He stayed there just long enough to scamper across the Huron goal for two touchdowns and a 13-7 win for Dorais' boys.

#### NORTHERN STATE O - MICHIGAN NORMAL 50

After their opening setback the Hurons settled down to business, and in their next contest handed Northern State Teachers' the worst beating they have suffered in years. During the fray Rynie used twenty-two men. Batterson, Ashley, Smith, Benedict, and Bob Arnold shared in the scoring.

#### ALMA O - MICHIGAN NORMAL 27

The Hurons continued on their scoring rampage against Alma the following week handing the Scots a 27-0 lacing to atone for a 12-0 beating suffered by Normal the last time the schools met. With Captain Simmons back in the lineup the Hurons were a new club. "Cowboy" scored one of the winning scores along with tallies by Batterson, Dirkse and Carson.

#### CENTRAL STATE O — MICHIGAN NORMAL 28

With Louie Batterson turning in the greatest exhibition of broken field running seen around Mt. Pleasant in some time, the Hurons romped over Central State's Bearcats 28-o. The win more than attoned for the humiliating 20-12 bounce Normal took the day of Homecoming from Central last season.

#### MICHIGAN RESERVES 6 — MICHIGAN NORMAL 15

For the first time the Ilurons were forced to come from behind to beat Michigan "B" 15-6. Normal got off to a bad start, and the Wolverine Reserves led at half time 6-0. But the lead was short-lived for Quarterback Frank Arnold ran and passed the opposition to death and guided Smith and Dirkse across with a pair of touchdowns that sufficed to win for Normal.


#### SOUTH DAKOTA STATE O — MICHIGAN NORMAL 12

It was a fighting band of gridders that took the field against South Dakota State in the grand finale to the Homecoming program the following week, and that fighting band routed the Western Jackrabbits 12-0 in one of the finest exhibitions of football seen on the local turf last season. The game saw the debut of Big Mel Thorpe as a backfield man. Mel had played behind the line in several previous games but opened up for the Homecoming tilt. He plunged and ran his way all over the field to score once himself and place the ball in position for Louie Batterson to carry it over for the other marker. The field generalship of Frank Arnold reached its height during this game.

#### lowa tate Teachers 12 — Michigan Normal 6

Determined to partially erase the defeats suffered at the hands of the Hurons in previous years. Iowa Teachers were an inspired gang of gridmen when Coach Rynearson sent his tired-from-travel Hurons against them in the annual Dad's Day tilt, and the result was a rather gloomy night cap to the 1932 season. The Hurons were defeated 12-6.

A graduation loss, comparable only with that festivity which took Vanyo, Shoemaker, Muellick, Stover and half dozen others, this year shows something like eleven names. Among those who tacked up the moleskin for good last fall were Captain Carl Simmons, Frank Arnold, Dave Smith, Olie Sanders, Walt Kazlusky, Mel Thorpe, Waldo Ashley, Carson, Stine, and several others.







#### 1933 COURT SEASON

With Harry Ockerman at the helm, Michigan Normal's Huron cagers went through their best season since 1925. Ockerman took up the task of coaching the Hurons this winter when Elton J. Rynearson assumed the position of Director of Athletics. During the winter the courtmen dropped but two games of the seventeen on their schedule. Back in 1925, with Rynie at the wheel, a strong band of basketeers won 16 cut of a possible nineteen. On paper the records of the two separate units appear about equal, but because of the longer schedule and in the light of the opposition met with the material at hand, it is generally regarded that the aggregation of the days when the present coach was a player instead of a mentor holds a slight edge.

Coach Ockerman started the season with the finest material displayed in Normal Gym for some time. He had forwards, guards, centers and all. In only the last mentioned department was there any sign of weakness. With Ashley out with a sore hand and Captain Walt Kazlusky nursing a strained knee, Ockerman searched high and low for a center. In the final analysis he took to Harry Solomon who filled the assignment in fine shape but worked in much better as a guard later in the season.

The season unofficially opened late in the fall term when Normal took the short end of a 20-21 count from the Alumni. But the defeat served only as an incentive to go on to great heights, and when the regular season was reached they were a determined aggregation, as was brought out in the record hung up.


Right after the opening of the second term the Hurons started on their spree. Olivet's M. I. A. A. Champs, Northern State, Michigan Mines, the reputed Loyola aggregation, St. Mary's and Central State fell in rapid succession before Normal met its first stumbling-block. But the Eagles of Orchard Lake were not to be taken twice, and in the following game measured Normal 24-22 in one of the most hairraising games witnessed on the local court during the season. Efforts of Bayer, Worzniak, Solomon, Jagnaw, and Captain Kazlusky proved futile against the determined Poles.

But the cagers only looked upon the St. Mary's whipping as a further incentive, and rode hard forward to take five more games before they were again halted; this time by Armour Tech, who caught them in their own gym one Friday afternoon in Chicago and measured Ockerman's sharp-shooters by one point, 31-30. The remaining four teams fell as did others during the season, and the Hurons brought their season to a dramatic climax swamping Northern State 38-21.

Individual scoring honors for the season changed hands, and Benny Bayer, runner up last year forged his way into the front rank with a high total of 120. Frank Worzniak, flashy sophomore forward was runner-up. The Hurons scored as follows:

#### 1932 CROSS COUNTRY

Under the tutelage of George Marshall, Michigan Normal's harriers went through another successful season. Marshall, taking up the reins dropped by L. W. Olds for a year, took the hill and dale aspirants early in the fall with anything but hopes for a great season. He was having trouble signing meets, and the material that showed itself at the opening of the early practice was anything but promising to a coach coming into his first year as a mentor. But Marshall took to his task diligently, and, before his initial meet, had moulded a gang of harriers possessing the finest and most even balance seen trotting over the local course for some time. In many meets the balance was so outstanding that the entire Huron aggregation crossed the finish line in a body.

In the first meet of the season Kalamazoo College proved little opposition for Normal, placing only two men among the first eight. Foster and Dunn ran off with first place honors in that meet, finishing fully fifty yards ahead of Osborn who counted third for the M.I.A.A. school. Chick Bellman jogged across the line to an easy fourth ahead of McKee of Kazoo who was just ahead of Caplis, Gibbs and Kahler who ended the Huron scoring.

Only Harry Werbin, who crossed the tape for a first place, stopped the Hurons from tearing off a slam in their second meet of the season in which they thoroughly trounced Detroit Y 20-39. Werbin is taking work in Roosevelt prior to entering Normal in the fall of the coming year. To keep himself in shape he has been running under the colors of the Y team. He is a former member of Millrose A. C. Caplis, Foster, Dunn, Kahler, Bellman and Gibbs finished in that order immediately after Werbin to give the Hurons their win.

The Hurons displayed their true form the following week against Adrian College, who was left at the tape without a single runner placing among the first six Hurons. Jack Caplis, star sophomore flash, was on the injured list, and did not compete in the meet, but his place was capably taken by Harold Ory who easily outdistanced the first Adrian man. The Hurons finished Captain Foster, Kahler, Dunn, Bellman, Gibbs and Ory.


Though Western State placed Ray Swartz and his teammate Harold Steele ran in first and second places in the State Intercollegiates at Lansing the following week-end, Michigan Normal's Hurons ran off with the state title for the ninth consecutive time with a low total of 27 as compared with the 37 massed by the Hilltoppers. As soon as the two Western aces had crossed the finish line, the Hurons' balance came into evidence, and Kahler, Foster and Caplis finished in that order in third, fourth and fifth. Pedler raised Western's hopes momentarily, but Bellman and Gibbs came in eighth and ninth and Dunn took a twelfth to clinch honors for the afternoon.

In a midwinter setting the Hurons lost the Central Intercollegiates to Michigan State led by the brilliant Tom Ottey and Illinois Normal who came into the Michigan town to take second.

When Tom Ottey suddenly developed a hernia as he lay on the training table in the gym just prior to the State A.A.U., the expected battle between Billy Zepp, Normal freshman ace, and him failed to materialize. Dimmed by the loss of their veteran hill and daler, the Spartans were easy prey for Coach Marshall's men, and fell in the two-sided affair, as it so developed, 16-39. Caplis crossed the finish line for first place honors well ahead of a fast field. Foster, Dunn and Bellman followed closely in his tracks for second, third and fourth, and Gibbs took a sixth to finish the team scoring.

Again balance prevailed—and the Hurons came through with a third place in the National A. A. U. Billy Zepp got his first taste of big time competition and was forced to a fifth, just ahead of the whole of the Huron varsity.

By graduation, Cross Country loses only Bellman whose place will be well filled by Zepp, Tom Quinn and one or two others who become cligible with the coming of another season.

#### 1933 GYM TEAM

On the three or four occasions the student body saw this new addition, never did it fail to wring from the audience a great vote of applause. On one evening, namely the Kollege Komedy, the showman, Terri Koski by name, fell from his mount before he had completed his act, and, though he was not injured by the fall, provided a great thrill for the crowd.

This year the tumblers added three new contortionists to their ranks. They were Gilbert Patch, Herbert Bean, and the above mentioned Koski. This trio, combined with the veterans, Olie Sanders, Ken Hawk, and Pete Peterson, gave the Hurons one of their finest displays since the days of Gus and Will.

Schools visited during the year included Ferndale, Western, and Cooley High Schools in Detroit, as well as Nolan High in the same district, Manchester, Romulus and many others.



#### TRACK SEASON

#### INDOOR

With budgets cut to a minimum, rendering extended trips out of the state impossible, Michigan Normal track suffered during both the indoor and outdoor seasons constituting its year over the cinder paths.

As snow fell and the thinclads went about preparing for the indoor season, Delmar Allman, former Huron weightman and more recently connected with the Physical Education Department as assistant to Head Coach L. W. Olds, took over the duties left by Olds, away on a leave of absence.

#### OHIO WESLEYAN

Allman whipped his proteges into shape in a short time, and before the season was many weeks old invaded Delaware, in the Buckeye state, to hand Ohio Wesleyan one of their worst lickings in years. The meet ended with the I lurons leading a 72-32 score.

#### STATE A. A. U.

Having run on board tracks all winter the Hurons made little more than a fair showing against a strong field which included a host of the University of Michigan's squad in the State A. A. U. meet held in Yost Field House for the second year.

#### STATE INTERCOLLEGIATES

Headed by Ray Lowry, who boosted the state mark in the pole vault considerably, Schatte, Beatty, Simmons, Hershey, and Fenner, the Hurons again ran off with honors in the State Intercollegiates held in East Lansing. No point total was kept, but had there been a scoring the Hurons would have won the meet easily.

#### CINCINNATI

Short of funds, the Hurons sent a four-man delegation to Cincinnati to compete in Xaviar Field House in the annual track and field championships in that city. The four, Captain McKinley, Lowry, Zepp, and Schatte, ran off with honors in practically all of their events, and carried many laurels back to the Huron school.

#### CENTRAL INTERCOLLEGIATES

Probably no greater triumph could have been recorded by the indoor squad than the winning of the Central Intercollegiate title at Notre Dame to top off activities for the winter. The Huron aggregation was led by Fred Schatte who was barely beaten by Ralph Metcalf. In beating Schatte the colored Marquette flyer smashed the world's record for 60-yards indoor. Zepp. McKinley, Lowry, and Beatty were first place winners in the event, but the title would never have been available had it not been for the host of seconds and thirds turned in by the remainder of the aggregation.

#### AT PENN.

During the season Gene Beatty, nationally known hurdler, went east where he successfully defended his Penn Relay's 400-meter hurdles crown for the third time, and in doing so went down on the books as one of the few individuals who has gained three successive Penn titles.

#### OUTDOOR

Opening the abbreviated outdoor season the Ilurons continued their prowess by overwhelming Kalamazoo College and Adrian in a Triangular meet which allowed the opposition only one or two first places.

#### UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN

But then they met their downfall. Though not favored to win, the Hurons were expected to give Michigan a close run for their money in the dual meet engaged in by the schools a couple of weeks later. But such was not the case and the Wolverines measured the Hurons to the tune of an 85-41 score.

As the Aurora goes to press the liurons are beating the track of Alumni Field hard in preparation for the State Meet.



#### BASEBALL SEASON

#### TPPER IOWA







Kalamazoo was a bit more difficult, however, and extended the Hurons, 4-3. Though extremely strong, Oberlin fell 6-1, the Hurons dropping only one match during the whole of the afternoon.

Back to the season, however, one finds that the team was made up of two



With only one freshman team out of a possible four participating in a regular spring schedule, Normal yearling interest in the spring sports was cut to a minimum. The Frosh Trackmen under Coach George Marshall was the only aggregation that drew up a regular schedule. Baseball aspirants engaged in two or three games, but did not operate on a regular seasonal basis.

Such a state of affairs, however, did not halt the ever-flowing stream of talent.

In track, Marshall developed two or three of the likeliest looking runners seen on the local path in years. In addition to Zepp and Quinn, both of whom he turned over to Coach Olds at the beginning of the spring term, the Frosh mentor has a long distance man, the equal of whom has not been seen since the ill-fated Roger Arnet donned the spiked shoe for the Hurons. The runner in question is Russell May, who hails from Erie, Pa., and who turned in a 4:23.2 mile to hand Bill Zepp his first beating as a varsity man at the hands of a Frosh.

A week later, against Ann Arbor High, after being clocked at a 4:40 mile, the Penn. lad smashed the college half mile record to the time of 1:56.4.

Onlookers claim May to resemble  $\Lambda$ rnet in almost every manner, and if he continues to improve as he has in the past year he should cut his time for the distance close to world's record clocking.

Another trackman about whom Huron followers are going to hear plenty before he has gone through many meets is Charles Eberhard, Grand Rapids yearling, whose specialty is the high hurdles. He runs the lows, too, but is much faster over the high sticks. In competition he has not been beaten, and in the Intersquad meet was successful in winning his favorite from Beatty, varsity expert.

Others who are going to work into the varsity ranks in good shape next fall are Baker, Heidimos, Werbin and one or two others.



The boy exhibits great presence of mind, "I do, sir, and it's very difficult."


