
The Men's Union of Michigan State Normal College again, as in the past, distinguished itself as the outstanding organization on the campus. The nineteen hundred and thirty-five organization of the Union ranked well above such organizations on other campuses throughout the United States. The basis for this statement is taken from information gathered from statistics which President Ray Lowry collected at the National Conference of Men's Union Presidents, held at Purdue University.

MEN'S UNION

At the beginning of the college year, under a New Deal and F. E. R. A. jobs for all, the Men's Union promptly started preparation for the premiere of Homecoming celebrations. The Homecoming festivities, under the general chairmanship of Ray Lowry, were built around the theme of the Huron Indians. The prizes for floats and house decorations were cups which will be rotated each year and will become the permanent possession of the organization winning either trophy three times.

In their next undertaking, the men again set the precedent for parties which were to follow, in presenting the most successful and colorful of "Drags". Music was furnished by Duane Yates and his famous band. Decorations were in black and silver with one hundred and fifty silver stars studding the stage which was draped in black with "Yule Log Drag", lettered in silver in Old English, across the back. Sparkle was added to the decorations by two spotlights—one of green and one of red, directed upon the stage.

Precedent is not to be taken lightly; so with this thought in mind and with memories of the "Drag" still vivid, the Union members produced the 1935 edition of the Spring Breeze. This "Breeze" was virtually a windstorm as those who were at the party will attest. The orchestra was excellent and did its best to make the wilted students throw off the thought of classes and enjoy themselves.



MEN'S UNION EXECUTIVE BOARD

The Executive Board of the Men's Union for 1935 was an outstanding organization dedicated to service and co-operation. The Executive Board, presided over by Ray Lowry, was very active in keeping alive campus tradition. Under the guidance of the Executive Board, the Homecoming celebration, Yule Log Drag and Spring Breeze became realities.

The Board also suggested the changes in the conduct of the class games and urged the men to observe the rules concerning smoking on the campus. It was through the efforts of Robert Arnold, Senior representative, that Ellsworth Vines was brought to our campus.

The Executive Board is always ready to do things, hence it has started plans for a Musical Comedy, which will be given next year.

Too much credit for the success of 1935 Men's Union cannot be given those men who worked unceasingly for the promotion of the welfare of the men on this campus.

WOMEN'S LEAGUE

The Women's League has a three-fold purpose. It endeavors to offer to every League member the opportunity to develop the technique of friendliness, leadership, co-operation, and democracy. It sponsors a program that provides education in cultural use of leisure time. It co-operates with the faculty in maintaining proper standards of college life.

The social program includes teas for transfer students, honor students, and house-holders, the Harvest Hop, the June Jig, and the Co-ed Prom, which this year took

the form of a Reincarnation Party.

For each class the League sponsors a club: Viventes offers freshman women social orientation, sophomores continue this program through the Goldfeather Club; in Euthalia, the junior women study and attend the best current plays; the senior women, through Book-a-Month, review novels of distinction.

Intellectual life is stimulated through Faculty Chats and Women's League Assemblies. Women students excelling in forensics, scholarship, creative writing, art,

and music receive awards.

The League has an outstanding Campus Sister program. During Freshman Week a freshman woman is under the care of a Campus Sister, who helps her in adjusting

herself to college life.

The Women's League is a member of the Intercollegiate Association of Women Students. The president of the League attends its annual convention. This year the president-elect attended the National Convention held at the University of Indiana.



This Province reaches from Maine to Michigan and South to the Ohio river. Ninety-two contestants from seventeen colleges entered the various events. Mary Joan Purcell won first place in Women's Extemporaneous Speaking, LaVon Cutcher won second place in Women's Oratory, and Arthur Hughes won third place in Men's Oratory. The Men's Debate team, Arthur Hughes and Dick Lichtenfelt, was eliminated in the fourth round of debates, after nine of the seventeen schools had been dropped, losing to Kent College who later won the tournament. 

The local Panhellenic, which has been active on this campus since 1926, is composed of representatives from both local and national sororities.



The hawk brings down the smaller bird that sings.


If man could but be born untrammeled, free, Without the elder's burden constantly Upon his head, then life would be a joy And man a butterfly, not just a bee.

Again we talk of nothings. What's the end? If there is no answer, can we hope to mend With idle mouthings the problems of the years? If there is a way, on what does hope depend?



The final score was Central 14, Ypsilanti 13. In this game the whole team distinguished itself, but Jarosch, Parker, Hanneman and Rovinsky excelled. The cold, raw, rainy, October 27 game was played at home. Our team plowed and splashed to a 13 to 6 victory over Alma on a sloppy field.

In this game the two Wilson brothers, Dirkse, Welever and in particular, Butch Parker and Bob Jarosch did outstanding work.

At a post-season meeting their team-mates honored Jarosch and Parker by electing them co-captains of next year's team. This is the first time in the history of Michigan Normal football teams that co-captains have been elected.




To sum up all of the games, of which many were played on two or three consecutive days, we find that the Huron team scored 427 points as against 417 scored by all their opponents.



VARSITY CROSS COUNTRY

Coach Olds called out his 1934 cross country team with the knowledge that three of the varsity men were veterans in the long distance game, Rosenkrantz, Werbin, and Zepp. Both Gibbs and Caplis had made many stirring runs for Michigan Normal. Caplis dropped out in mid-season to recover from a leg-injury, and returned to run the last two meets.

Two recruits from the freshman team of last year, Frye and Hall, strengthened the team greatly. These men, the only inexperienced members of the team, are to be commended for their grit and good work.

Our first meet of the season, a triangular affair, with Adrian and Lawrence Tech resulted in a perfect score for the Huron Harriers, with Zepp finishing first, closely followed by Werbin, Rosenkrantz, Frye, Gibbs and Hall.

Kalamazoo came to Ypsi for a dual meet, in which the Normal runners again ''slammed'' for a perfect score.

Our next meet was with Ball State Teachers of Indiana, on October 27. Zepp and Werbin finished first and second, with the Ball State captain, Clevenger and his team-mate, Armstrong, finishing third and fourth.

An invitational meet, our fourth, took the team to Loyola University of Chicago. Zepp finished first, closely followed by Werbin in second place and Rosenkrantz in fourth. Michigan Normal tied with Milwaukee State Teachers for first team place, and won on the flip of the coin.

On November 10, the Ypsi team lost its first meet to a powerful Michigan State team by a score of 25 to 34. This race turned out to be a two-man battle between Captain Zepp of Normal and Captain Ottey of State. Zepp won with Ottey placing second.

The Central Intercollegiate Cross Country Championship, held on Michigan State's five mile course, was another loss for the Michigan Normal Harriers. Lash of Indiana won first honors, followed by Sears of Butler, Ottey of State, and Zepp of Normal. The Normal won third place in the race for team honors.

On November 28, the team split, with Zepp going to lowa City to the National A. A. U. Championship, where he placed seventh against former title holders, and the rest of the team went to the Michigan A. A. U. at Kalamazoo where Harry Werbin became the Michigan A. A. U. Cross Country Champion.


VARSITY TRACK

When Coach Olds and Captain "Chuck" Eberhard looked over the slim number of men who responded to the call for varsity track they plainly saw that the Hurons would have to rely on quality of individuals rather than quantity in their coming track season. And individuals they were who brought the name of Michigan Normal into fame in 1935 track history by their flashing performances.

Led by Captain Eberhard, this brilliant band included such men as Abie Rosenkrantz, Billy Zepp, Hal Baker, Jim Matthews, Harry Werbin, Bowman Hall, and Santee Brockman.

Our first indoor meet was the Millrose Games of New York City. Baker, Hall, Matthews, and Rosenkrantz brought the Hurons to the front in the college mile relay in 3 minutes, 29 seconds flat. Bill Zepp, suffering from a bad cold, placed no better than fifth in the two mile run.

In the Michigan A. A. U. indoor meet at Ann Arbor, February 9, Michigan Normal again won the mile relay in 3:28 and Bill Zepp set a new record in the two mile run, defeating Tom Ottey of State, running the distance in 9:21.8.



Zepp again beat Ottey and broke his own record of the previous week. Rosenkrantz set a new field record for Yost Field House of 1:55.1 for the half-mile run.

Next day, the Ypsi speedsters easily slaughtered a fresh Eutler University team. Zepp broke the old mile record of 4:26.8 by running in 4:25.4.

On February 24, our team went to the Michigan Intercollegiate Relay Carnival at Lansing and romped home with the mile and two-mile relay championships. Baker, Hall, Matthews, and Rosenkrantz made up the mile team while Zepp replaced Matthews in the two-mile relay.






