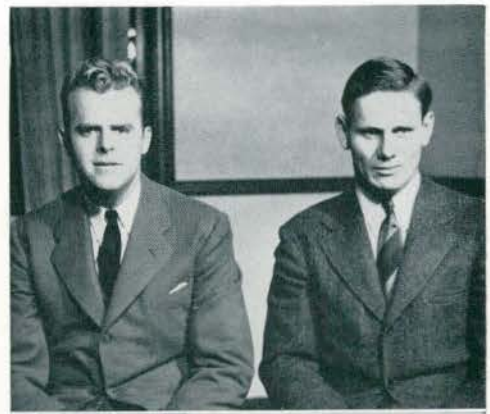
MEN'S UNION

The second annual Open House was met by an enthusiastic crowd who took over the Union for a night, and danced and played games to their hearts' content.

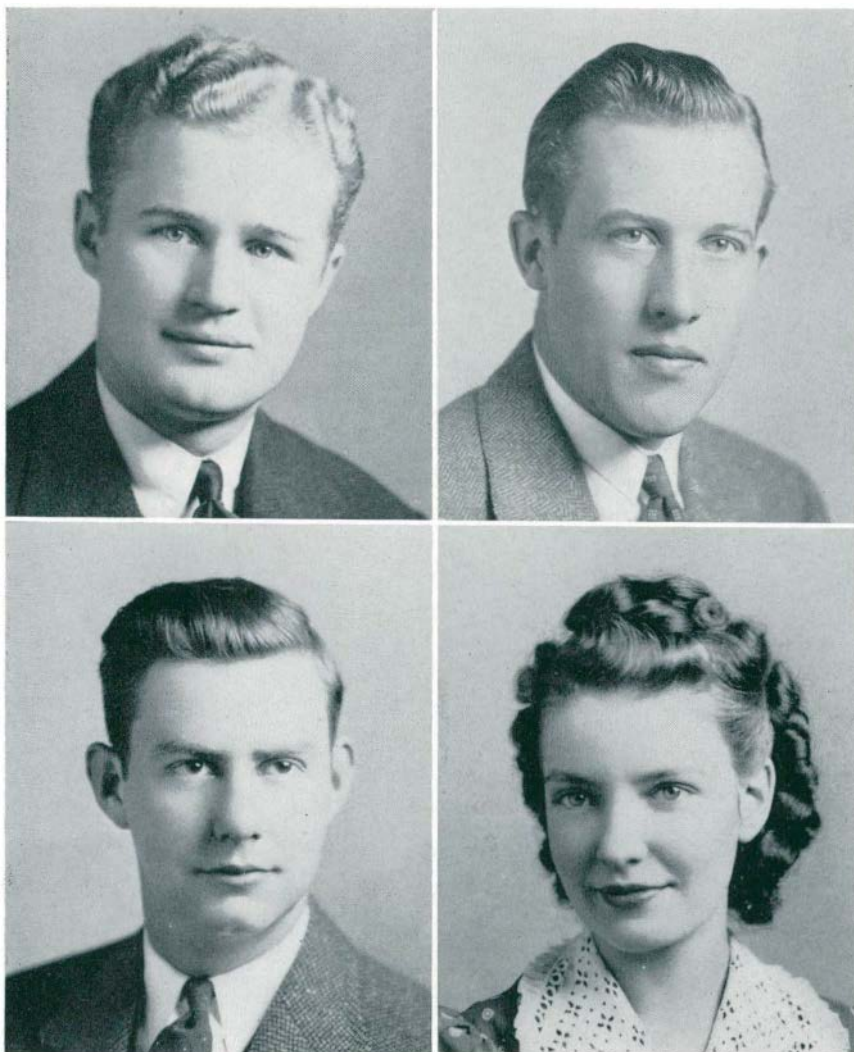
Aiding with Class mixers, teaching non-dancing students the essentials of how to keep off a partner's feet—these, too, are included within the realm of the Committee's work.

1940 stands in the record books as a bad season for Coach Elton J. Rynearson and his Michigan Normal gridgers. The Hurons garnered one victorious decision in seven starts, tallying 31 points for a low score.

Injuries and the lack of reserves haunted the squad and took their toll in the win-loss columns.

In the initial contest the Hurons battled Illinois Normal to a scoreless tie in a game that was played entirely between the two 20-yard lines of Briggs Field. Captain Walt Siera was forced to leave the game in the second quarter with a knee injury that followed him throughout the grid season.

Normal stepped out of its class on the night of October 11 when the Ryniemen were whitewashed by the U. of D. Titans under the lights of the University of Detroit Stadium. Gus Dorais' three elevens chalked up 47 points and blanked the visiting Hurons. Quantity was the overwhelming factor in the defeat of the Green-and-White.

Bowling Green State was scheduled for the third helping of Huron scalps when the Falcons toppled the Normal squad in the mud of University Field, Bowling Green, Ohio. The Ohioans got the 15-0 nod.

The Bearcats of Central State Teachers College handed the Hurons their fourth consecutive scoreless defeat when the Hurons again played under the arc-lights at Mount Pleasant. The Hurons held the Cats to 24 points as the Normal rooters, inspired by the return to the grid wars of Capt. Siera, again saw him removed from the contest with a further aggravation of his injured knee.

Everything was on Normal's side for the next game with the Alma Scots. Who cared that the Scots were undefeated and boasted the strongest team in the MIAA and one of the best in the state? It was Homecoming in Ypsi and the Hurons turned the trick!



BALL

A record crowd of 5,000 rooters, grads, pros, and students, packed the stands, including the new north bleachers, and watched the morning clouds disperse, and the warm, afternoon sun shine down on the festival crowd. And Normal didn't let them down. Alma was defeated 24-7!

The Scots tallied first and held a slim 7-6 lead at the end of the first quarter. But Normal's inspired football overcame the razzle-dazzle tactics of the invaders—shovel passes, laterals, double and triple pass plays were of no avail against the Hurons' power and aggressiveness. George Newlands hit pay dirt twice for the home team while Walt Siera and Dick Gilles carried winning mail once, scoring in every quarter of the thrilling contest.

Imbued with a new thirst for victory, the inspired Michigan Normal squad went into the next game with the Tartars of Wayne University full of new hope and offensive plays. But the newly created strategy couldn't overcome the early Wayne lead and the Hurons bowed to the Detroiters, 19-7.

Eight Hurons brought their collegiate football careers to a close when Michigan Normal rang down the curtain on her football season with her final defeat at the hands of a dark horse eleven from Kalamazoo College. The Kalamazoo Hornets were rewarded with their first and only victory of the season as they vanquished the Huron hosts, 13-3.

Pat Heffernan, Joe Grady, Ed Poly, Dave Gates, Jack Yuille, George Newlands, Warren Gross, and Captain Walt Siera carried the pigskin for the last time for Michigan Normal. They left behind them a squad to be led by Captain-elect Andy Newlands and a few veterans. Coach Ryneason will fill the remaining berths around his promising freshmen and before you know it, the 1941 season will be on. Kick off!

CROSS COUNTRY

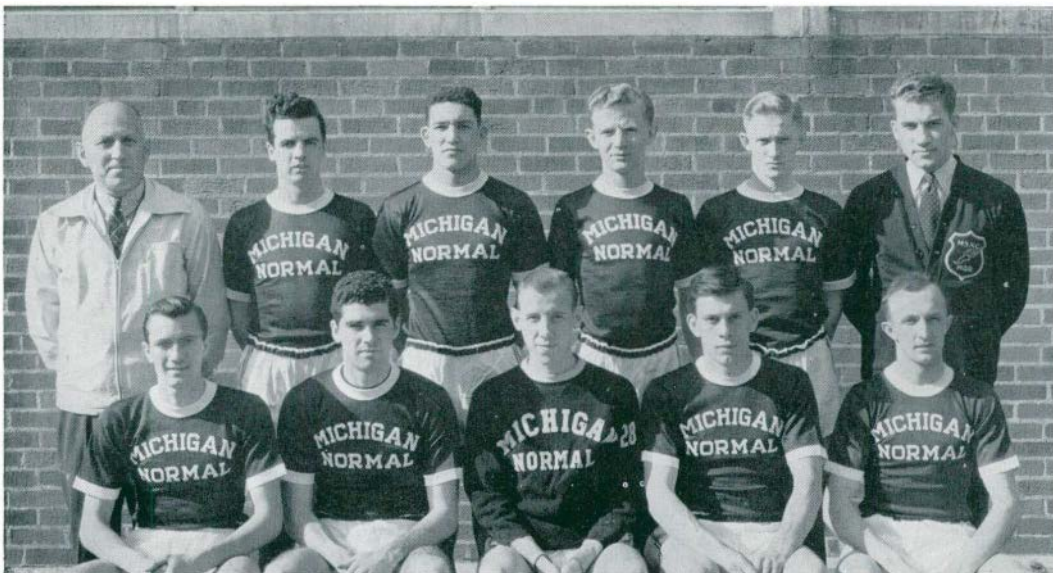
The cross-country squad may not attract the crowds that other Michigan Normal teams do, but the hill-and-dale sport certainly draws its share of plaudits on the Huron campus. Success of Michigan Normal's thinclads cannot be traced to any one man; the team performed well as a unit, as must all successful cross-country brigades.

The Huron's performances in the National Inter-Collegiates and the National A.A. . will probably linger longest in the memory of Coach L. W. Olds and his harriers. In the former meet, Ypsi's strong seven man squad finished second to Indiana University. Considering that 22 colleges and universities were represented in the meet at East Lansing, the Hurons' second place was regarded as a distinct upset. Behind Indiana, with 65 points, and Michigan Normal, with 68 points, followed Rhode Island State, 1940 I.C. 4-A champs, Michigan State, Notre Dame, and Ohio State. Being run in conjunction with this meet, the Central Inter-collegiates distance title was captured by Michigan Normal. The Hurons last held this conference crown back in 1927.

Not satisfied with their success in the above meet, the following Thursday Normal placed second in the National A.A.U. cross-country run held at Detroit. Championship honors were claimed by the New York A.C., but Michigan Normal placed two men among the first five. Behind Don Lash, Greg Rice, and Luigi Beccali, came the Huron stars—Tom Quinn and Duane Zemper. Capt. Bob Lee finished twelfth in the large star-studded field.

Durable Tom Quinn carved a niche in Normal's hall of fame by remaining undefeated in dual meet competition for four years. Quinn picked up a first place in the Hurons' initial meet against Central State. This meet proved hardly a warmup for Ypsi's harriers as they annexed the first seven places. However, the following week at Kalamazoo the Hurons were forced to accept a runner-up spot to Michigan State in the State Inter-collegiates. The Spartans again edged out the locals the next week at Ypsilanti, when Michigan Normal acted as host in the Michigan A.A.U. First place in this meet was taken by Quinn, who covered the four-mile course in 22-03. Duane Zemper claimed a second, while Capt. Lee finished fourth.

From then on the Hurons showed steady improvement and went on to shine in the National meets. Michigan Normal's record for the last 21 years of dual meet competition now reads: 81 victories, three defeats. To uphold the victory tradition of the Green and White, the Hurons have started by electing Duane Zemper captain of their 1941 cross-country forces.

A capacity audience of over 3000 people attended to hear the 160 voices in the choir blend in singing those Christmas songs beloved by all.

The entire program was recorded, and many of the renditions were presented to the audience and choir in record form following the concert. The program consisted of such Christmas favorites as *O Praise the Name of the Lord* and *The Cherubic Hymn*, both of which were written by Gretchaninov, and *Gospodi pomilui* by Lvovsky.

Although this marked the last Christmas Concert under the direction of Professor Alexander, the memory and inspiration of his achievements in music will long remain with all those affiliated with him.



IN honor of the Yule season, the Life Sketching class, under the direction of Miss Strafer, designed a Christmas mural. This sketching was an outstanding work of art, fashioned to fit the modern age and civilization and showing the *American way* of celebrating Christmas. Contrasted with our *American way*, was the European way. A picture of escape, fire and bloodshed represented the European chaos and made Christmas seem more of a blessing in a nation free from war, strife, death and devastation. In the hearts of the students this mural found a definite place and set these same hearts beating a bit faster in gratitude that their Christmas gift might be love, friendliness, or happiness rather than a destroyed home, destitute family or perhaps a well directed bullet.



SPEED, height, capable reserves, and razzle-dazzle coaching were not enough to give Michigan Normal's basketball team more than four victories out of fifteen contests played during the 1940-41 cage season. Loyal Huron fans filled the Central High School gym several nights, only to be disappointed by an in-and-out varsity which was mostly "out."

Major coaching duties were handled by Frank Worzniak, a former Huron basketball luminary. When the hoop season ended, members of the team knew a wealth of cage tricks, but somehow such tactics do not always assure victories. Bad luck seemed to plague Normal all during the campaign. When one player was experiencing a good night on the court, a teammate would find himself in a slump. In all fairness to the varsity squad, it must be pointed out that they lost six tussles by four points or less.

After dropping decisions to Wayne, Central State and the University of Michigan, the Green and White finally hit the victory column against Kalamazoo College. This win served only as a temporary reprieve, for the Hurons followed by losing to Wayne, Alma, St. Mary's of Orchard Lake, Hope, Central State, and University of Detroit. Normal's second victory finally came against Bowling Green on February 8. After Kalamazoo proved too tough to handle, the Hurons returned to Ypsilanti and trimmed Hope. Losses to Alma and Northern State followed before the Hurons annexed their final win of the year against St. Mary's of Orchard Lake. A none-too-prosperous season ended with a trimming by the University of Detroit.

The job of returning the Hurons to victorious ways lies largely in the hands of Fritz Bennetts and Ed Kontrymowicz, who have been elected to captain the team during the 1941-42 season.

With a year's total of 136 points, Captain Burman Misenar established a new scoring record for Michigan Normal players. Jimmy Walsh sent 135 points through the hoop during the 1938-39 season.

Varsity awards were presented to eleven cagers: Misenar, Bennetts, Kontrymowicz, Doug Cullin, Charles Oxley, John Grant, Carl Alfsen, John Shada, Roy Lawrence, Rolland Langerman, Al Greenwood, and manager Art Maschke.



THE All-Campus boxing tournament returned to the sports scene after a year's absence, and the result was a "knockout" in every sense of the word. The throngs which packed the old gymnasium for three nights were not disappointed. Fists flew fast and free, and every man battled hard from the opening round.

When the smoke had cleared after the finals, five new champs were crowned. They were: 126 pound class, Marlen Reber; 135 pound class, George Cole; 147 pound class, Eugene Lucarelli; 160 pound class, Fred Hobbs; 175 pound class, Vic Apple. In an exhibition heavyweight bout held the night of the finals, Herb Roehrs gained a technical knockout over Pete Savina.

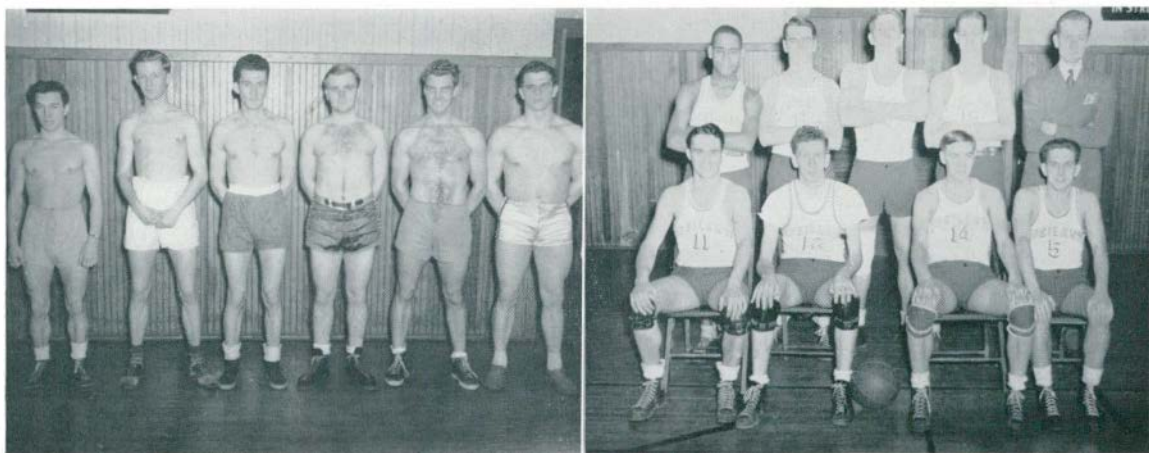
Reber, also an excellent wrestler, pulled a surprise by decisioning Johnny Rylko in the featherweight clash. In winning the 147-pound crown, Cole was given a real battle before gaining the decision over his close friend, Dwight Chapman. Gene Lucarelli's southpaw style puzzled Lester Heddle as the latter bowed on a technical K.O. early in the second round. Fred Hobbs, who had twice before been eliminated in All-Campus tourneys, came back this year with a bang. After disposing of the 160 pound champion, Andy Newlands, Hobbs came back in the finals to stop Dick Manning via the technical knockout route in the second round. Vic Apple was declared a victor when Harold Sonnenberg decided not to go a fourth round after a close fight.

Other men who participated in the bouts were: Newlands, Lee Sharp, Ed Voisich, Norris Wiltse, Jim Walton, Bob Klein, Lowell Beach, Bill Quinn, Clyde Lepisto, Art Willis, Bernard Hogan, Bob Kern, and Bob Lutz.

Jack Starwas and Joe Kolby performed capably in the referee duties of the tournament.

IN contrast to their varsity brothers, Michigan Normal's freshmen basketball team pulled through with a highly successful year. With Martin "Zeke" Zachar handling the coaching duties, the yearlings gained a record of nine victories and one defeat. The Huron first-year cagers handed a pair of lickings to Wayne frosh. U. of D. frosh, Saginaw YMCA, and Cleary College. The Selfridge Field Flyers also fell before the strong Ypsi freshmen. A five-point loss to the Saginaw "Y" accounts for the only defeat.

A host of classy players will move up to varsity competition next winter. Numerals were presented to ten yearlings: Ed Gilday, Howard Messenger, Bob Heimbuch, Sam Cott, Vernon Sherman, Louis Proctor, Pat Biondi, Charles Greig, Charles Sampier, and George Allen.

THE "Class of Tomorrow" greeted bleak February with the dance of the year, the J-Hop. It proved to be the most well arranged, best decorated and well attended J-Hop presented in many a year.

Reserves included Dana Hammar, Chuck Nemeth, Al Hutchins, Carl Alfsen, John Shoemaker, Pat Heffernan, Roy Renton, Sig Gretzner, Cas Wojcicki, Jack Simonds, and Ken Carakostas.

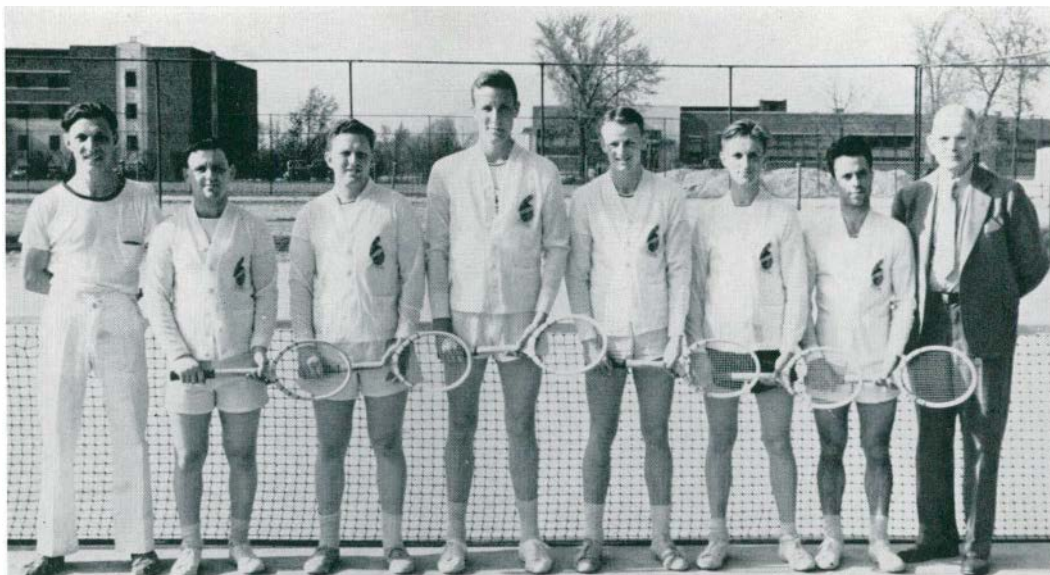
During the spring vacation the Hurons defeated Illinois Tech, 9-3, on Briggs Feild. A 2-1 victory over Hillsdale found hurler Ray Dennis annexing his second win. Then, after remaining undefeated in the first three contests, the locals suddenly discovered why some diamond experts claim that pitching is sixty per cent of a ball team. The mound mainstay, Dennis, developed a sore arm, and Carakostas, who proved to be the Hurons best relief hurler, was out of action with a broken nose. Normal fell before Michigan State and Wayne University in the next two games.

At this writing the Hurons have still to meet Illinois Wesleyan, Northern Illinois St. Teachers, Michigan, Wayne, Hillsdale, Michigan State, Wayne, Bowling Green, Michigan, Central State, and University of California.

Suffice it to say that the infield and outfield rated with the best produced at this college, the team possessed harmony, and produced results in keeping with the Hurons' fine record on the diamond.

TENNIS

“WE expect to turn in a creditable record,” stated Coach Paul Sampson as he watched his charges go through their initial practice. And thus the veteran Michigan Normal mentor, known by all as “Pop,” predicted that the Hurons would maintain their prestige in collegiate tennis affairs.

Four letter winners—Vic Mastromarco, Fritz Bennetts, Chuck Frogner, and Harold Schwartz—returned to represent the Green and White. This quartet formed the nucleus of a squad which had hopes of bettering the 1940 record of six wins and three defeats. George Yellin and Walt Lepisto earned the two remaining varsity berths.

After dropping their first match, 6-3, to Wayne University, the Hurons came back to whip Bowling Green by a similar score. The third match found the locals being edged out by the veteran Toledo Tennis Club, 5-4, at Toledo. Playing host to Albion College in the fourth tussle, the Hurons exhibited signs of their true power as they swept to a 7-0 victory. Coach Sampson's netters saw a rosy hue as they awaited competition from Wayne, Kalamazoo, U. of D., Michigan, Michigan State, De Sales, and Lawrence Tech.

TRACK

MICHIGAN Normal went into its 1941 track season crowned with laurels: Michigan State Intercollegiate and A.A.U. Champions, and American collegiate recordholders in the two-mile relay set in the Butler Relays at Indianapolis. These honors heralded the Huron thinclads as a powerful team, and track mentor L. W. Olds found difficulty in scheduling able dual-meet competition. He managed however to book the Hurons for what looked like the toughest and is turning out to be the best season so far.

The speedsters swept through their indoor season like the proverbial fire horse—with speed to burn. The opener was held at Waterman Gymnasium in Ann Arbor as the combined forces of Findlay and Kalamazoo Colleges fell before the Huron onslaught as the Green-and-White placed one-two in every event on the card. Loyola University of Chicago was the next victim with the Tartars of Wayne University rounding out the list of the dual-meet fallen.

Michigan Normal hit its stride during the indoor relay contests. The crack Huron quartet of Duane Zemper, George Cole, Joe Brzezinski, and Capt. Tommy Quinn alternated with the mile, two-mile, and distance medley relays to garner extra wreaths for the Normal Hall of Fame. They began with the annexation of the two-mile and medley distance relays at the University of Illinois Indoor Relay Carnival on February 15, and followed by capturing the mile and medley distance at the Michigan State Relay Carnival in East Lansing two weeks later. This foursome concluded their hardwood accomplishments when they set another American College Record, this time in the distance medley event at the Butler Relays. They negotiated the two-and-one-half miles in 10 minutes 25.5 seconds to close the lid on the indoor season.

Zemper, Cole, Brzezinski, and Quinn supplied a laudable beginning for Normal's outdoor season by earning outstanding relay honors at the Annual Drake Relays at Des Moines, Iowa. The Huron quartet bested a field of fourteen universities on Friday, April 25 when they came from behind to win the distance medley of the university division in 10.15.8. The Normal runners left a final stamp at Drake when they returned the next day to win the college division two-mile relay.

The team as a whole opened its outdoor competition against a strong Miami University team and downed the Ohioans in a thrilling struggle. Michigan Normal, admittedly weak in the sprints, is pointing for further track acclaim as it roars down the final straightaway.

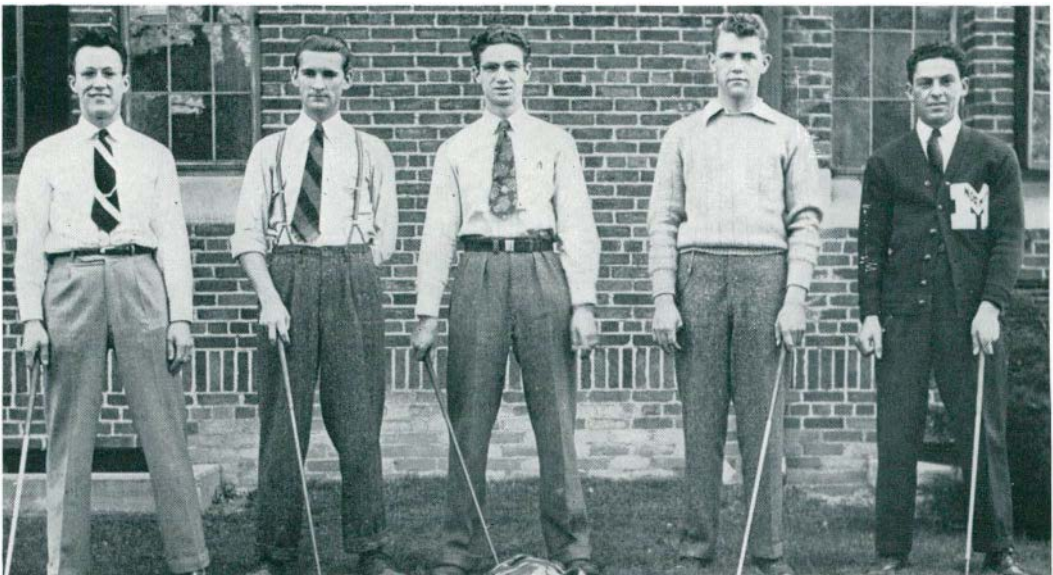

GOLF

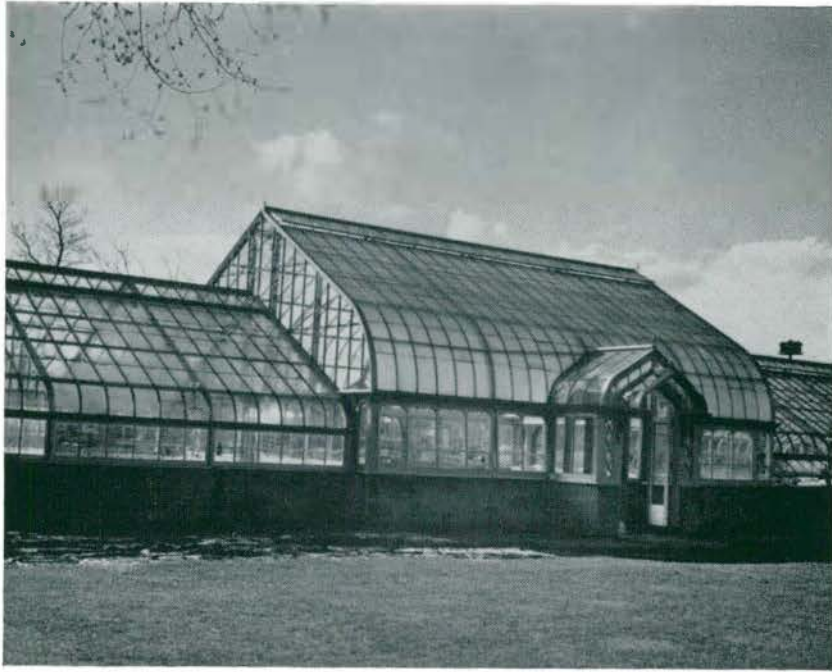
