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



Creating Eastern Michigan University (originally Michigan State Normal School) in 1849, the state Legislature defined the purpose of the school to be, "The instruction of persons, both male and female, in the art of teaching and in all the various branches that pertain to a good common school education. Also to give instruction in the mechanic arts, and in the arts of husbandry and agricultural chemistry, in the fundamental laws of the United States, and in what regards the rights and duties of citizens." The purpose has been changed, and the name of the school altered, but in many respects, Eastern retains the same purposes.

Since its establishment, the University has added programs of instruction in the liberal arts and sciences and various specialized and pre-professional fields. The aims of the educators are to provide a liberal and specialized education to fulfill the wishes of their students. By presenting the chance for a sound education to the students of Eastern, the faculty hopes to produce better citizens. This year the Aurora staff wishes to recognize the efforts and achievements of the administrative officials of Eastern Michigan University.


Mourns The Passing


Panhellenic Council joins with the Interfraternity Council to present several dances throughout the year, and to sponsor the annual Greek Week.



It has grown from an idea envisioned in 1906 to one hundred and ninety-one graduate and one hundred and ten undergraduate chapters throughout the United States and in foreign countries. 




Kappa Phi Alpha

The highlight of the spring semester was their semi-formal dance, the Orchid Ball. This dance was enjoyed by all.



Eastern Fellowship Christian



In this era of academic achievement and excellence the sound body must not lose its place as complement to the sound mind. The spirit of competition, the satisfaction of a fine performance, the thrill of victory provide the fulfillment of man's physical powers and accentuate the employment of his mental potential.

Eastern Michigan provides both varsity and intramural programs. There is varsity competition in baseball, basketball, cross-country, football, golf, gymnastics, tennis, track, and wrestling. Among the numerous intramural sports offered, one finds basketball, football, softball, table tennis, and track.

Our accommodations for these activities are expanding and improving as evidenced by the new \$1,600,000 Joseph Warner Gymnasium. Included in the gym complex will be three handball courts; a 75-ft. by 45-ft. pool with one and three meter diving boards; utility gyms for dancing, gymnastics, and wrestling; one massive gymnasium divisible into three by folding doors; classrooms; offices, and locker rooms.




Bill Abraham and Ed Gallup were elected team captains for the season. Gallup had an exceptional season, leading the conference in scoring and placing third in rebounding.
