Whether one was working at a party headquarters, taking on the role of an election official, campaigning for the candidate of his choice, or just waiting in line for two hours to cast his vote, November 7th proved to be a momentous day for some — a discouraging day for others. This year being the first year that 18year-olds had the right to vote brought many politicians to the campus. Students had the opportunity to meet Former U.S. Senator Eugene Mc-Carthy, Representative Roy Smith, Congresswoman Martha Griffiths, Jane Hart, and Attorney General Frank Kelley, among others. Taking advantages of these opportunities, students became involved in the electoral process of this nation.

Another first this year for the 18-year-olds was legal gambling in the form of a state lottery initiated by the state legislature.

Because of the large numbers of newly enfranchised voters and the extremely long ballot with eight proposals, many voters had the "Luck" to stand in the rain for hours in order to cast their votes and use their democratic right.

With all the good and bad experienced in the electoral process, Election Day '72' proved to be an important first for EMU students.

Giving into frustration and pressing classes students result in parking five blocks away only to get a \$5 parking ticket from the Ypsilanti City Police for parking overtime.



Students who struggle through this continuous problem deserve more than just a diploma - they deserve special recognition for their stamina.








the long and winding road to a future




Dr. Harold E. Sponberg: a president with a purpose

University President Harold E. Sponberg shared the concerns and frustrations of the Incians by initiating an American Indian Heritage and Awareness Week last fall. Prompted by the Indian takecver in November of the Bureau of Indian Affairs in Washington, D.C., Dr. Sponberg stated that it was time to "magnify the Indians' accomplishments" and to "get Indian achievements into the proper perspective." 

The Biology Department saw student awareness of what it actually had to offer. Increased enrollment and participation resulted from the departments campaign efforts and a growing interest in environmental problems.

Involving students in the tri-county community was a goal of the social work expansion. The staff was doubled in order to create field placements for students and provide guidance for them during the year.

The Psychology Department invited students to be subjects for experimental research. The Dramatic Arts and Music Departments provide students with more opportunities to pursue individual interests.



Life with Young Children, and Infant Care and Guidance were two new courses that were added to the Home Economics program. They also employed four new instructors.




grad students reach for a secure future

A new degree to the graduate art department has been added where students can now obtain a master of fine arts degree from the program.










The Placement Center, a small remote brick house on the corner of Forest and Lowell, aids in securing positions for students after graduation.


The center serves graduates by notifying them of the availability of jobs being offered which fit their qualifications.

A new assistant director of Business and Industry, Mr. Kenneth Macek, was placed on the center's staff and he initiated a new job directory especially designed for the business student.

In attempt to save mo ey, the Housing Office collected the pillows in the dormrooms and had the

students provide their own. The cost of not having to replace the pillows annually will, supposedly, conserve on University funds.

This was also the first year that the Housing Office made it mandatory for all treshmen and sophomores to live on campus, unless they commuted. Through extensive checking, the administration found some 150 students facing possible suspension for violating the housing code. A nice proble n: 200 vacant rooms, 150 students with apartment leases, 150 possible suspensions . . . and a deficit budget.


academic miscellanea


Capturing the aura of the moment in pictures and words in order to create symbols that try to come close to the feelings of the times.


This year the University of Toledo became the first Mid-American Conference foe to face Eastern's brand new "wishbone" offense.


Unfortunately for Eastern, Toledo managed to snap the wishbone and come out with the longest end. The score? Toledo 16, EMU 0.

The situation became worse against powerful Tampa University. Eastern retained their same score but Tampa more than doubled that of Toledo's.


Even while losing, there was a dignity in knowing that the team tried it's best. In spite of the score, the game with Toledo could have gone either way.






harriers power to ncaa finals


Cross Country running is a difficult sport to participate in, for it requires hours of sweat and miles and miles of practice running.
